THE MOON IS A RISEN

Every month has a full moon, sometimes even two, and just about every culture from early American settlers to 19th century farmers to the Chippewa tribe describes each months full moon by giving it a name. Some describe the season and others the season of activities:

January 3rd: Moon after Yule, old Moon

February 2nd: Snow moon, Sucker-Spawning Moon

March 3rd: Sap Moon, Crow Moon, Lenten Moon

April 2nd: Grass Moon, Egg Moon, Budding Moon

May 2nd: Planting Moon, Milk Moon

June 1st & 30th: Rose Moon, Flower Moon and Strawberry Moon

July 30th: Thunder Moon, Hay Moon

August 28th: Green Corn Moon, Grain Moon or Rice Making Moon

September 26th: Harvest Moon, Fruit Moon

October 26th: Hunter's Moon, Falling-Leaves Moon

November 24th: Frosty Moon, Beaver Moon and Ice-Flowing Moon

December 24th: Moon before Yule

A Blue Moon is when there are two full moons in the same month.

There are many myths about the moon and one that the gold prospecting is better on the rise of the full moon, instead of the decent of the full moon.

A great many gardeners believe that planting vegetables during specific phases of the moon, and/or dates made favourable by the motions of the other heavenly bodies, is beneficial. Some almanacs are published especially for this purpose. Gardeners disagree on the exact details, but it is widely believed that planting when the moon is waxing ensures rapid germination and growth. Another idea is that vegetables which grow underground should be planted in the dark of the moon, and those which grow above ground should be planted at full moon.

Directions: Take Hwy. I-15 to I-10 East to the Cottonwood Springs & Mecca Road Exit (this is approximately 50 miles past Palm Springs). Go North on Cottonwood Springs Road for approximately 30 miles.

This claim is located in a very remote area. It is recommended for tent or

vehicle camping. The last 20 miles to the claim is via dirt road, which at times can be washed out, depending on the rain for the season. So a high clearance vehicle is suggested and at times a 4x4 might be needed.

There is NO services, NO water, NO nothing. The nearest help and water is at the Cottonwood Springs Ranger Station and Campground, which you pass 6 miles north of I-10.

Fine gold to nice nuggets have been

found here. Good for Drywashing and metal detecting.

A potluck will be held Saturday night. Please bring a dish to share.

As always, a common, night time fire will be held. Firewood is always welcome.

This claim is in the Old Dale/New Dale mining district that is rich in gold mining history. The area has many abandon mines and trails to explore. Be Safe.

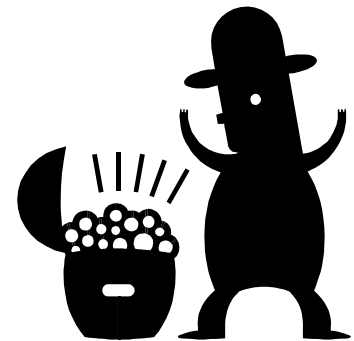

METEORITE'S

At last month's meeting, Joe Jezisek mentioned a great location to hunt for meteorite's in Arizona. The following is specific information on the location and coordinates.

"To get to Franconia, take the 40 east to Arizona. When you hit the Arizona state line, you are 13 miles away. Just a little ways pass the 95 South, at mile marker 13, turn off the 40 onto Franconia Road. If you go to the right, which is the south side of the 40, that is where the bigger ones were found. If you turn left, you will be on the north side of the 40, and that is where he has found his. For the newbie the north side is the place to hunt. So turn left and go down the dirt road till you come to the train tracks. From there hang a right and go down the dirt road for about 1/4 of a mile. You will come to a place where you can see some cars have pulled off and parked. It is right by the two towers with lights on them for the trains. Now if you feel lucky you can go over the train tracks here and get on the north side of the train tracks, and keep going down the road, till you get to a tunnel and park right by it. If you do that just make sure that you park off that road. I have heard that the train guys have called the cops on someone for parking on their road, which blocks their access (do that at your own risk). I would just park by the tower lights and walk over the train tracks to the north.

For the north side, I would hunt with the smallest coil you have. You can't cover a lot of ground, but that's ok, the big, big stuff has been found already. You just need to hunt around the rocks that the bigger coils could not get in between. The name of the game out there is slow and low.

GPS Coordinates: N34 45.441/W114 14.153 for the field and N34 45.314/W114 13.528 for the tunnel."

2.37-CARAT DIAMOND FOUND IN U.S.A.

An Arkansas man has found a 2.37 - carat white diamond at the world's only diamond bearing site where visitors are allowed to search for and keep the gems they find.

Gary Dunlap of Jefferson named the diamond the "Star of Thelma" to honor his wife. Dunlap's find was the fourth largest diamond found in 2006 at the Crater of Diamonds State Park in Murfreesboro, Arkansas.

In all, 486 diamonds have been found at the park this year.

RAY'S TIPS

Always use a plastic vial for your gold when in the field. The glass shows your "find" better, but breaks easily. If you use the glass vial, leave a few air bubbles in it to allow for compression of the air when it heats up. A few people didn't and when the vial warmed up (usually while in their pockets) the bottom of the glass vial blew off. Reason? Water doesn't compress - the heat expanded the water to blow point and they had a mess.

SEARCHING THE BEACHES

Now is the time of the year to be watching for the low tides. The wave action from approaching storms constantly keep the sand in motion. Sometimes it adds sand to the beach. We look for the times that it removes the top layers to get us down to the older layers where the heavy objects settled down.

Pay attention to what the sand looks like and feels. When you see the darker fine sand that is hard packed then you probably are in the area that is most productive for coins and rings or anything heavy. Your light colored sand probably is the sand that the wave action has been adding to the beach. This sand almost never has any targets in it. Cuts can be very productive at times, if the erosion exposes deep targets they wash out usually within ten feet of the cut. When you dig into this sand you will have a top layer that just washed out and it will be a different color of the sand than the sand below, The targets are right where the two colors meet. If you are on a slope and have a real puffy sand under your feet it probably washed off of the towel line and has very few targets to recover.

So pay attention to your surroundings and learn, by experience, where you recovered the most targets so when you got to a new beach you can pick out the most likely places that are productive.

Have a plan.

MINER'S COOKBOOK CORNER

JANUARY

NATIONAL SOUP MONTH

Soup maybe as old as time it self, well, at least as old as the history of cooking.

Ancient, medieval or modern, soup, stew, porridge or gruel, New England chowder, Italian minestrone, Chinese wonton, Russian borscht or Spanish gazpacho; local ingredients make up all variations of this dish we call "soup".

In the 19th century canned and dehydrated soups were available and could be found in the home pantry. It was used by the military, served on covered wagon trains and of course a staple for the cowboy chuck wagon.

Easily digested, nutritious, filling, simple to make, eaten by the rich or poor, prescribed to the sick/invalid, (remember grandma's homemade chicken noodle soup, when you were sick?). Soup may be the perfect choice for any meal.

Wonder What or Refrigerator Soup

Use the leftovers in your refrigerator to make this wonderful soup.

Use that leftover Sunday chicken, the Monday night roast, or the ground beef from taco Tuesday, any meat will do.

In a 4 - 6 quart stock pot, bring to a boil 1 ½ quarts of water,

Add 1 ½ tsp. salt, 2 celery stalks, leafs and heart if desired,

1 medium onion, peeled and chopped, 1 to 2 potatoes, peeled and cubed,

1 - 16 oz. canned tomatoes, 1 to 2 cubes of chicken or beef flavored bullion.

Now clean out the refrigerator - add all those little bits of leftover veggies, green beans, carrots, corn, lima beans, cabbage, peas, mixed veggies, rice, macaroni and the meat (cut up in bite size pieces).

Cover, simmer and heat thoroughly.

Season to taste with salt, pepper, garlic salt.

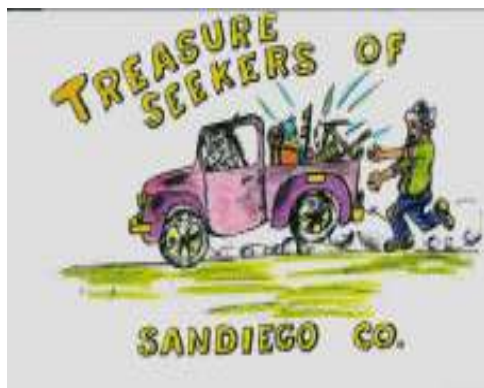
