California Suction Gold Dredging Update

The latest hearing on the suction gold dredging moratorium in California took place February 14 in front of Judge Gilbert Ochoa in Rancho Cucamonga. Nearly 50 miners showed up to lend their support. Judge Ochoa set up a calendar for the case, with the most important date being July 24, 2013. This is when attorneys representing the miners will seek summary judgment and an injunction to get California suction gold dredgers back in the water immediately. Let's send some bodies for support!

Dental Gold

"It's gold, you paid for it, it's yours. So if we ever need to take it out, you'd get it back". - The Dentist

Over the years, I've had a number of gold crowns and fillings replaced with more modern technology ceramics. I've had some dental offices not so forthcoming with 'my' gold. One time I asked about the gold crown, sitting on the tray, just removed from my mouth; the technician distracted me and when I looked back to the tray the gold crown was gone. Another dental office gave me back the gold crown (without my asking), cleaned, in an envelope with the address and instructions of a reputable gold recycler. If memory serves, I got a check in the mail for about \$60 for my troubles. I remember, I whapped that gold crown with a hammer to flatten it and make it easy to mail.

Yellow dental gold normally consists of a high-grade alloy with the following composition

- 50% to 90% gold
- 1% to 30% silver
- 0% to 20% palladium
- 0% to 12% platinum

White dental gold can consist of alloys of varying value:

- A high-grade gold-platinum alloy
- A slightly less valuable silver-palladium alloy
- An almost worthless Mo/Cr/Co steel alloy or titanium

ACCESS TO PUBLIC LANDS REPORT

Land Closure and Asbestos Emissions from Mining:

The Bureau of Land Management in a news release on August 27, 2012, has withdrawn about 29,000 acres of public land in Central California from public access. The withdrawal is in the portion of Clear Creek Management Area designated as the Serpentine Are of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC) in southern San Benito County and western Fresno County. In the news release the BLM stated "The BLM ordered the temporary closure of the public lands in the Clear Creek Serpentine ACEC on May 1, 2008, in response to a human health risk assessment by the United States Environmental Protection Agency." "Public Land Order 7795, approved on August 1, 2012 withdraws 28,953 acres, more or less, of the public lands from location and entry under the United States mining laws to minimize impacts to human health and the environment from asbestos emissions from mining operations in the Clear Creek Management Area's Serpentine ACEC," said Rick Cooper, BLM Hollister Field Office manager. The area was temporarily withdrawn in 2010 while various studies and analyses were made

to support a final decision. This withdrawal extends the temporary withdrawal to 20 years. This means Rock hounding in the Clear Creek area of Central California is off limits for another generation of Rock hounds.

Endangered Species: Sage Grouse or Rock hounds/Miners?

Sage-grouse habitat covers millions of acres of Public Lands in 11 western states and portions of southern Canada. The habitat area under study covers parts of Northern California and large portions of Nevada. The U.S. Department of the Interior has given the western states the option of developing a plan to preserve the sage grouse or the federal agencies would make the decisions. There is a fear the sage grouse might be listed as endangered and result in further restrictions on the public lands, including uses such as mining, grazing and rock hounding.

In Nevada, a legislative committee has endorsed a plan to preserve the habitats for the declining sage grouse population, but millions of acres of public lands continue t be open to grazing, mining development and energy projects. Debra Struhsacker of the Nevada Mineral Resources Alliance told the legislative committee the proposal of the Bureau of Land Management would prevent mining development on 14.6 million acres of public lands. This Nevada proposal may affect our amateur mineral collecting and rock hounding in large amounts of Nevada's Public Lands.

The legislative committee agreed to send letters to federal officials, and a resolution will be introduced in the 2013 Legislature. They will emphasize the steps being taken by Nevada to preclude the listing of the sage grouse as an endangered species. The federal officials need to hear from Rock Hounds and Miners who collect rock and minerals in Northern California, Nevada and the other 9 Western States where the Sage Grouse Habitat covers collecting sites. The fate of the collecting/mining areas is up to you as the stake holders in your Public Lands. If Miners and Rock Hounds do not make their concerns known millions of acres of America's Public Lands may become off limits in favor of the sage-grouse.

MINER'S COOKBOOK

Root Beer Float Cake

1 box of White or French Vanilla cake mix (with pudding mix is fine)
1 1/4 cups (12 oz.) Root Beer, (such as A & W or Dad's) do not use diet soda

3 eggs

1/4 cup vegetable oil

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Grease and flour a 10" bundt pan (I use Pam spray)

In a large bowl mix together the dry cake mix, 12 oz. root beer, eggs and oil until smooth. Bake for 35-40 minutes or until done. While cake is cooling make the Root Beer glaze. After 10 -15 minutes turn cake out onto serving platter and pour the glaze over the cake while it is still warm. If you do not have a bundt pan, use a 9" x 13" cake pan and make the root beer frosting instead. It's better the second day so make it a day ahead of time and let it sit. Keep in refrigerator

Root Beer Glaze

1 cup Powdered Sugar

3 Tablespoons Root Beer

Tip: use a zip lock bag to mix the powdered sugar and root beer, after it's mixed snip off the corner of the bag and drizzle the glaze over the cake.

Root Beer Frosting

1/4 cup Root Beer

1 envelope whipping mix, such as Dream Whip

If your membership is not current and you are prospecting on our claims, you are prospecting illegally and will be dealt with accordingly to existing law.

For some bureaucratic reason (saves us money), we need to do and track work on our claims that improves the locale. When you visit our claims, write down: Your Name, Address, phone, claim name, date, work done and time spent. Get this information to our Claims Manager, Robert Cook. rmjcc@cox.net He will fill in the correct paperwork and track it.

LIBRARY

EQUIPMENT FOR MEMBER'S USE

Treasure Seekers has a storage unit at Diablo Mini Storage in Escondido. Earl Sterrett is the Equipment Manager.

Inventory: 2 Sluice Boxes – 3 feet long

1 Sluice Box – 4 feet long

1 Mini Recirculating 9 inch Sluice with pump and motor and tub.

1 Mini Recirculating Sluice with pump and motor (no tub)

1 Highbanker with motor and pump

1 Gold Grabber (box type high banker with motor and pump)

1 Small Dry Washer (no leaf blower)

1 Large Dry Washer (Keene 151 with leaf blower)

1 Dry Vac (5 gallon size) with motor1 Magnetic Sweeper on rollers

All that we ask, not much, is that, anything checked out, is to be returned in the same or better condition than when it was borrowed. It's understandable, with the nature of our interest, the equipment will get some bumps and bruises; which is acceptable. But if parts are lost or broken, it is the responsibility of the "borrower" to repair or replace.

i.e. If a motor is on it's last leg, you are using it and it poops out, we understand that it's not your fault and don't expect you to replace it. On the other hand, if you have been using the motor for an extended period of time, forget to check if oil is needed and the motor burns up that would be a different story.

Give Earl Sterrett at 858-922-4547 a call, if you would like to use "our equipment." He asks that you give him a couple of days notice when you might need something, and when items are returned they are CLEAN. All equipment must be returned by the meeting following when it was checked out. This will allow you any where from one week to three weeks usage.

Books by Blakey

Blakey Stanford, a TSS member, is the proud publisher of many interesting books. His books are compilations and re-prints of old magazine articles from the 30s, 40s, 50s and later. Many are first hand accounts of what it was like when there were real prospectors. There is nothing being printed today that compares to these articles. While pursuing your outdoor endeavor of work, play, recreation or sport and you are challenged by a representative of a governmental agency or public servant, regarding the legality of you activity in their area, you should do the following:

- It is wise to politely ask if you are breaking any law. If you are informed that you are breaking the law, then ask for an explanation of the law and any municipal code that may pertain to the law.
- You should do as the governmental representative asks you, then ask for their name, badge number, position, and the agency and district they represent. Record this information along with the Date, time, and location of the area where you are located.
- If you do have a pleasant response from any of the representatives, such as being informative, cooperative, or helpful, we would like to hear about them also.
- Give this information to your local PLP office or representative and they will advise you of the appropriate procedure to follow.
